
With the installation of our new meter reading software, and EyeOnWater program, Town residents have the ability to access their water accounts and monitor their water usage.

EyeOnWater (EOW) services give consumers direct access to their water consumption data and provide tools to help them manage their water use.

EOW enables customer outreach and delivers information to them on the web and through mobile apps.

EyeOnWater also delivers leak alerts and usage trends to customers through email, text messages or onsmart device notifications.

Council Highlights

Town Council attended the 2021 Alberta Urban Municipalities Association Convention & Trade Show in Edmonton last week. We took part in some great education sessions to learn about our Associations' efforts over the past year, and different opportunities to grow our communities. We also had presentations from Premier Jason Kenney and MLA Rachel Notley who talked about the Provincial Policing that has been brought up in the media as of late. The Town Council had the privilege of meeting with the Minister of Municipal Affairs Ric McIver. The Council expressed their concern with the reduced funding of the Municipal Sustainability Initiative.

Here were the Education Sessions that were offered to over six hundred Municipal leaders that attended.

1.ADVOCATING FOR SMALL COMMUNITIES IN A BIG WORLD – This session provided intelligence on political decision makers and how to build relationships with them. It also helped with developing strategies to conduct power analysis and networking.

2.BUILDING INDIGENEOUS RELATIONS IN YOUR COMMUNITY – Chief Randy Ermineskin from Ermineskin Cree Nation discussed how to effectively build relationships with our local indigenous partners.

3.NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN HYDROGEN AND IMPACTS TO MUNICIPALITIES – Opportunities with carbon capture and facilities in the area. Discussed the energy that will be saved going this route in the future compared to hydro and fossil fuels only.

4.CYBERSECURITY FOR MUNICIPALITIES – Awareness of Cyber-attacks and how to help prevent it in our community. Why there is importance to protect our community. Recognizing threats and understanding the risk.

5.SETTING THE TABLE FOR SUCCESS – This session provided ideas and tools to help develop effective working relationships with fellow councilors.

6.CLIMATE CHANGE AND MUNICIPALITIES – Exploring what municipalities can do to mitigate the issues with climate change, best practices for action and programs that are available to help.

7. HOW TO IMPLEMENT A COMMUNITY FOCUSED STRATEGIC PLAN – Strategic planning within our community. Presentation from Town of Westlock as they shared stories of a new path of strategic planning.

8.THE ROLE THAT ELECTED OFFICIALS PLAY IN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Highlighting key roles that elected officials play in supporting their communities in economic development, and how proper asset management can help.

•Town Council sent a letter to Alberta Health Services asking to have the access road to the hospital repaired and maintained. AHS responded right away and hired a contractor come to Beaverlodge and patch up all the holes. They also committed to maintain the access road over the course of the winter. They will review any repairs or upgrades requiring to be done in the spring.
